The New Post-war Lincoln, The Cosmopolitans by J. Paul Denter, U.E.

The second world-war over, Lincoln benefited from the buyers' market as did all other auto makers. Still the Company knew the day would come when their cars would be greeted with raised buyer expectations and stiffer competition. To this point, since the demise of the big 'K' series cars, the Lincoln Continental and Lincoln Custom excepted, Lincoln had been competing in the upper medium rather than the full luxury price market.

Nineteen forty-nine would see this situation rectified with the introduction of the two series of Lincoln motorcars - the upper medium priced Mercury based Lincoln and the luxury priced Lincoln Cosmopolitan.

These were the very last cars to reflect the influence of Edsel Ford. The styling and engineering were seven years old when the first car rolled off the production line. Against policy perhaps, it mattered not to Edsel Ford and E.T. (Bob) Gregorie who spent time in their hidden private studio designing post-war cars instead of

developing camouflage patterns and other war work.

Had the war not intervened these Lincolns would have hit the market in 1946 or '47. It may not be unfair, the foregoing understood, to describe the cars, as some have, as dated when compared to the new Cadillac's fresh post-war styling and upto-date engineering. Still, it must also be kept in mind that Packard's upper level Custom eight also used the slab-sided "inverted bathtub" design, as did Nash 1949 through 1951.

Nineteen forty-nine would prove to be Lincoln's best sales year to date, 73,507. It would be 1972 before that record was broken.

Mild styling modifications came in 1950 and again in 1951, which brings us to our featured car.



The '51 Lincoln Cosmopolitan Sport Sedan pictured here is a very early production car, as evidenced by the chrome and gold wings sitting atop the stainless steel side moulding - these wings were a running deletion about March of '51. In point of fact, this is car number 30 (of 12,229) off the line - completed about 7:20 on the morning of Monday, October 9th, 1950. While this car was being completed in the Warren Avenue

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Editors Message



plant (Detroit, Michigan) we Canadians were waking to celebrate Thanksgiving Day.

Interestingly this was only the fourth '51 model that this shift of assemblers had seen since they started work at 7:00 a.m. So, you can imagine assembly was a little slower on these cars than it would become as workers grew more slower, but not necessarily more careful. Jerry Northam; of Milford, Ontario; who did the cosmetic restoration of this car, reports that the assembler working on the driver's side had been attentive to his task while the fellow working on the passenger side was not. How do we know? Seems the assembler on the passenger side missed installing every other retaining bolt on the chassis. We can only speculate what the malady may have been, but can imagine all manner of amusing explanations.

When I purchased the car, in the fall of 1990, it had been driven a mere 40,150 miles. The original owners, an Oregon ranch family, no doubt did most of their driving in pick-up trucks leaving the car for the formal family occasions - wedding, funerals, church Sunday and the like.

The car, having come from a very dry region of the state was rust-free, almost, when I acquired it. The only corrosion was a patch - on the inside of each rear fender - of surface rust no doubt caused by condensation. A little elbow grease and rust remover remedied the situation. That the car came from a ranch is attested to by, what Jerry referred to as 'ranch undercoating' - a combination of clay, straw and manure. It's so hard - like concrete - that it took a hammer and cold chisel to remove a chunk. The remainder is still there.

My understanding of the car's history is as follows. The car was finished on October 9th and shipped to an Oregon dealer where it rested undercover until November 15th, 1950. That was the date that all Lincolns were unveiled across North America. So the car had been incommunicado for thirty-four days before being sprung on the world. It was purchased soon afterward.

It must be remembered that the Korean conflict (police action, war) had started in July and many in the United States feared a return to car rationing. So, just about every car that was available was scooped up. I suspect that this was the motivation for the purchase of this car.

Options were not a forte of this car. A heater was it. There were plenty of standard equipment features though - Hydra-Matic transmission, hydro-electric power windows and front bench seat, vacuum powered antenna, wheel covers, full wheel shields (skirts) covering 8.20 X 15 four inch wide white wall tyres. Painted Kent Grey Blue, a colour that to some appears light blue and to others (myself included) light green, the car didn't have a great deal of presence in my

eyes. At delivery the dealer had installed dual exterior rearview mirrors.

After years of watching for one of these cars to come available I came across a notice, in *Continental Comments*, for this one. A brief phone call to the then owner in Tacoma, Washington, was followed immediately by a call to the travel agent. I'd made the decision to purchase the car based on a couple of photographs and a verbal description.

The idea was to fly to Washington State and drive the car home. Thirty-five hundred miles, over the Great Divide, across prairies, through a drenching rain storm, along side roads and down highways. Nothing proved too difficult for this marvelous highway locomotive - but that's a story for another day.

I've used the term rare in describing this car. Indeed, after considerable research I've discovered that this is the oldest known '51 Lincoln Cosmopolitan, of any body style, extant and one of only a very few '51 Cosmopolitan Sport Sedans registered with any of the Lincoln specific clubs. As an aside, let me relate that one such Cosmopolitan Sport Sedan exists in Australia, a right-hand drive unit that, we think, is the car that originally belonged to a Hong Kong mafia (Tong) don.

Over the course of ownership we've added a number of options that were available for this car - road lamps, rear window wiper, vanity mirror/lamp, gas door lock and emergency brake warning light. Reversing lamps and spot-light are next on the list.

Two-toning was a must what with the slab-sided styling. Sheffield Green was applied to the top to compliment the Kent Grey that was retained on the body. The two-toning, a combination not offered by the Company but both authentic '51 Lincoln colours, greatly improves the car's appearance. It now has presence.

The rides astride a 125 inch wheelbase, powered by a 336.7 cubic inch flathead "Invincible" V type eight cylinder engine developing one hundred, fifty-four horsepower propelling the car to a top speed of 105.5 m.p.h. A full one and one half mile per hour faster than the overhead valve Cadillac competition.

This Lincoln was acquired for go rather than show. That said, it must be admitted that the restoration has given us a beautiful car that has been displayed in several Toronto area malls. It represented it's era at the 'Glass House' reception during the 75th Anniversary of Lincoln celebration in 1995, won its class at the Lincoln Experience staged at the CCCA-Gilmore Classic Car Museum and the Edsel Bryant Ford Award at the Great North American Land Yacht

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party, and he is legendary for never leaving the bandstand during a dance.

(President John F. Kennedy could not help asking Mr. Lanin when he went to the bathroom, according to many reports, all of which seem to neglect to give the answer.)

Mr. Lanin was famous for giving away multicolored cotton hats, 50,000 a year, with "Lester Lanin" emblazoned in script behind the brim. He liked to say he was in "the happiness business."

"Serve the public!" he said in an interview with The Times in 1987. "Whoever you play for, try and make sure you were part and parcel of something happy, so if the woman whose party it was sees you on the street 15 years from now, she'll say, 'Lester, you made my party.'

Nathaniel Lester Lanin was born in Philadelphia on Aug. 26, 1907, the youngest of 10 boys. His grand-

Mr. Lanin was a tiny man who demanded that his musicians neither drink nor use drugs. He never addressed clients by their first names. It was "Mr. Rockefeller" or "Your Highness."

He said he took cues from the dancers, and adjusted his music accordingly.
"I watch their feet," he said in an interview with The Christian Science Monitor in 1980. "If they're out of meter, something's wrong."

Mr. Lanin once loved a very young dancer named Dottie Littlefield, who died tragically at 23, he said in an interview with the London Sunday Mail in 1985. Her favorite song was "Night and Day." He started every evening with that song for 30 years.

He was married once, to an actress and former Miss Texas, but he told The Times that the marriage fell apart because she "spent more time on the road than I

did." He left no immediate survivors.

Mr. Lanin made at least three dozen records, including one of Christmas carols he spiced up with his trademark lively tempo. The album cover featured a youthful Lester Lanin wearing a Santa suit and a demure woman peaking over his shoulder.

An oft-told story, repeated in Forbes magazine in 1987 and elsewhere, related the night Mr. Lanin was playing a debutante ball attended by Charles Tandy, the founder of the Tandy Corporation. The businessman did not want the evening to end, so he kept pressing large wads of cash into the bandleader's palm each hour to keep the music going.

The music finally stopped when Mr. Tandy collapsed on the dance floor. He died the next day.





Bob Johnson reporting on the January, 2009 LCOC winter board meeting.

Committee meetings were held on Thursday, January 15th and Friday, January 16th to develop action plans to solve our financial deficit due to our membership drop and the current recession. During all committee meetings every cost item was discussed in detail, from postage increases, trophy costs, printing costs and interest income.

2008 had a loss of \$15, 275 with a loss of 164 members with year ending total of 3404 members. Jack Shea, our Treasurer reported; "Where the general economy has an impact on the financial results, it appears that our lack of aggressiveness in many areas has a great impact. Expenses continue to rise and with the loss of membership, the fixed cost drives up the cost of servicing each member". Our planned dues increase of \$6.00 a year was implemented. This increase and the expense reductions should provide more financial stability for the LCOC.

Of course, it's always much better to increase membership than to decrease services, so the main focus for 2009 will be member retention on a state by state basis. What works in each state was discussed at length in both Membership and Regions committee meetings to share ideas that work with other regions to improve our communications, member recruitment, and retention, what type of activities our members enjoy and have fun at. Our member recruiting plans will be emphasized with a goal of every member recruiting at least one new member for LCOC in 2009. LCOC had positive membership growth in only 9 states and 11 states had a loss of 8 or more members in 2008. For 2009, we need your help to increase the positive growth that we have had in some states and reverse the losses that we have had in other states. As an interesting note, our International membership grew by 19 members in 2009; the Norway region by itself grew by 25 members.

This board meeting was very up beat, even with many difficult decisions made with input from all directors in attendance. The Club's focus for all Club decisions is to improve how our members are serviced, communicated to, treated and enjoyment of Club activities.

Our motto for 2009 is "Members are the back bone of the LCOC and will be treated as our most important asset". The Club will make every attempt to promote fun, fellowship and enjoyment of the Lincoln marque at every club activity that our members and guests attend.

We will continue the five free LCOC memberships given to each Region and National Director to entice new members never belonging to LCOC, with the hopes that once they see all the fun and benefits of belonging, they will renew year after year. Regions were asked to give the first year region membership free to new LCOC members to increase participation at both regional and national events. We will continue our Member a Month program where a member will get one free month of membership for every new member they recruit. If you know of a Lincoln owner that you can't get to join LCOC, and you feel he might be a good long term asset, contact your nearest Region or National Director for further assistance.

The point I'm making is we really need every member to make an effort to help by recruiting new members and getting involved in our regions and in our national club. Please remember, this is your Club and we need your help to recruit new members and improve our retention of current members by welcoming them to all our events. Working together, we will enjoy success.

LCOC needs you to recruit at least one new member in 2009, more would be even better, and the best part is you may make a friend for life. Please help!!!
