

Lawrence Peter "Yogi" Berra 1925 - 2015

Lawrence Peter **'Yogí" Berra** (May 12, 1925 - September 22, 2015) was an Amerícan professional baseball catcher, who later took on the roles of manager and coach. He played 19 seasons in Major League Baseball (MLB) (1946-63, 1965), all but the last for the New York Yankees. He was an 18 -tíme All-Star, and won 10 World Series championships as a player—more than any other player in MLB history. Berra had a career batting average of .285, while hitting 358 home runs and 1,430 runs batted in. He is one of only five players to win the American League Most Valuable Player

Award three times. He is widely regarded as one of the greatest catchers in baseball history and was elected to the Baseball Hall of Fame in 1972.

Berra was a natíve of St. Louis and signed with the Yankees in 1943 before serving in the U.S. Navy in World War II. He made his major-league debut at age 21 in 1946 and was a mainstay in the Yankees' lineup during the team's championship years beginning in 1949 and continuing through 1962. Despite his short stature (he was 5' 7" tall), Berra was a power hitter and strong defensíve catcher. He caught Don Larsen's perfect game in Game 5 of the 1956 World Series.

Berra played 18 seasons with the Yankees and retired following the 1963 season. He spent the next season as their manager and then ioined the New York Mets in 1965 as coach (and briefly a player again). Berra remained with the Mets for the next decade, serving the last four years as their manager. He returned to the Yankees in 1976, coaching them for eight seasons and managing for two before coaching the Houston Astros. He

(Continued from page 4) was one of seven managers to lead both American and Natíonal League teams to the World Series. Berra appeared as a player, coach or manager in every one of the 13 World Series that New York baseball teams competed ín from 1947 through 1981. In all, he appeared in 22 World Series, 13 on the winning side.

The Yankees retired his uniform number 8 in 1972; in an unusual twist, Bill Dickey also wore number 8 and both catchers had that number retired by the Yankees. The club honored him with a plague in Monument Park in 1988. Berra was named to the MLB All-Century Team in a vote by fans in 1999. For the remainder of his life, he was closely involved with the Yogi Berra Museum and Learning Center; which he opened on the campus of Montclair State University ín 1998.

Berra quit school after the eighth grade. He was known for his malapropisms, as well as, pithy and paradoxical statements,

Yogi Berra was born Lorenzo Pietro Berra in a primarily Italian neighborhood of St. Louis called "The Hill" to Italian immigrants Pietro and Paolina (née Longoni) Berra. Píetro was originally from Malvaglio near Milan in northern Italy; he arrived at Ellis Island on October 18, 1909 at the age of 23. In a 2005 interview for the Baseball Hall of Fame, Berra saíd, "My father came over first. He came from the old country and he didn't know what baseball was. He was ready to go to work. And then I had three other brothers and a sister. My brother and my mother came over later on. My two oldest brothers, they were born there— Míke and Tony. John and I and my sister, Josie ,were born in St. Louis."

Berra's parents originally gave him

ference was it had heated steering wheel and mirrors. Probably one of the best decisions I made.

I ordered the car February 5, 2015, and my wife passed away February 10. Morries were great and said they would hold the car till I was ready and if I wanted to cancel, they would return my down payment. (This was Morries as we knew them).

Since I bought this car, I have driven 57,000 miles and I have used my last free oil change.

I will admit most of my miles are highway miles. I have driven to Montana, 1,000 miles each way, three times. My first trip was straight through in 10 hours — never again. The only stops were for gas; which was also a "pit stop." I was not that tired as I went and sat through a "recital" for another two hours when I arrived. Since then, I stay one night out each way, usually at Bismarck, North Dakota; which gives me a chance to visit and have dinner with the Andahls.

I also drove last February to Scottsdale, AZ with only one night out. I can't really say enough about how comfortable a ride you get with this vehicle. I contemplated on updating to 2018, but there really are no significant differences between the 2015 models and the 2018 models. I have now decided to see what changes will be in the 2019's. The only real motivation for change would be the relatively high mileage that I would have on this vehicle late next year when the 2019 models become available.

My only other concern is that the Michelin tires had to be replaced at 40,000 miles. I understand that this is similar to all vehicles today. Not like the "old days" when the original tires went 60,000 miles or more.

Being 84 years of age and driving the long distances I do, and in comfort, what else can I say? Lincoln does it in perfect style and comfort.

All good things come in three's and MKC's are no exception. Besides John and Mary McCarthy, Bob Roth, our good

friends and members to the North, John and Dorothy Palmer also own a MKC.

While John and Dorothy have more than a few Lincolns in their garage, a space closest to the door is reserved for their everyday driver, a Lincoln MKC; which is used mostly by Dorothy in her frequent treks from their home in Barnum over to Moose Lake to the South, Cloquet to the North and the bustling metropolis of Duluth.

The Palmers previously had a Ford Escape, the Titanium model; which is about the nicest level of trim that Escape offers. They decided that it was time to take the next step upward and take a good look at the MKC. Both Dorothy and John liked what they saw, the Lincoln level of trim, interior layout and options really made the difference and they eventually went home from the dealership in Duluth with a new MKC.

Dorothy drives it most of the time. She really likes the all-wheel drive. It is a great feature for wintertime driving, especially when you live in the northern part of the state and so very close to the North Pole. Dorothy also likes both the heated steering wheel and the heated seats. With below zero temperatures common place, from the middle of December through much of February, it is nice to have those creature comforts available with just the flick of a switch. With the 2.3 liter, turbocharged engine, it has plenty of pep to keep up with all kinds of traffic, and can easily exceed posted speed limits. It is very quiet, whether at a stoplight idling or at freeway speeds, you can hardly hear the engine working. Dorothy reports that with most of her driving, she averages between 24 and 25 miles per gallon. A lot of that driving is done over short distances, but over longer distances, with steady speeds, the mileage does get better.

All in all, Dorothy likes their MKC, John who is a big fellow, wishes the front seats were just a tad larger for greater comfort on long trips. (Continued from page 6)

the nickname "Lawdie"; which was derived from his mother's difficulty pronouncing "Lawrence' or "Larry" correctly. He grew up on Elizabeth Avenue, across the street from boyhood friend and later competitor Joe Garagiola. That block was also home to Jack Buck early in his Cardinals broadcasting career and it was later renamed "Hall of Fame Place". Berra was a Roman Catholic, and he attended South Side Catholic, now called St. Mary's High School, in south St. Louis with Garagiola. Berra has been inducted into the St. Louis Walk of Fame.

He began playing baseball in local American Legion leagues where he learned the basics of catching while playing outfield and infield positions, as well. He also played for a Cranston, Rhode Island team under an assumed name. While playing in American Legion baseball, he received his famous nickname from his friend Jack Maguire, who, after seeing a newsreel about India, said that he resembled a Hindu yogi whenever he sat around with arms and legs crossed waiting to bat or while looking sad after a losing game.

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2019 Lincoln MKC goes for the heart of the market



A fresh grill and some new tech could bring over more converts for the hotselling MKC

Lincoln is updating the vehicle that it says draws the most customers from rival brands in hopes of further accelerating growth in a stalling luxury market.

The freshened 2019 MKC compact crossover features new infotainment and safety technology and the mesh grille found on Lincoln's newest products, including the Continental and MKZ sedans and the Navigator SUV. The 2019 MKC is due in showrooms next summer.

Even as overall U.S. sales of luxury cars and light trucks are roughly flat through October, Lincoln deliveries have edged up 2.4 percent and MKC sales are up 8.7 percent to 22,507. The MKC is also Lincoln's best-seller in China — a market it expects eventually will surpass the United States in overall volume.

Since the MKC's introduction in 2014, Lincoln executives say almost half of the crossover's sales have come from customers switching from other brands. "We recognize it takes a lot to attract a buyer from other luxury competitors, but the Lincoln MKC has that kind of appeal and we believe that the new MKC will capture even more luxury clients," Lincoln President Kumar Galhotra said in a statement.

The new MKC was formally introduced to the public at the Los Angeles Auto Show.

Besides the change to the front end, the 2019 MKC undergoes a few other exterior tweaks, including new colors, wheel choices, LED lights and chrome accents on the back end.

Inside, the crossover will offer Ford's Sync 3 infotainment system with Apple CarPlay and Android Auto. It will also add driver-assist features including precollision assist with pedestrian detection with automatic braking. Active park assist, lane-keeping alert and blind spot information system with cross-traffic alert can be added as options. Ford will also offer three new Black Label trim options.

The 2019 MKC will carry over the standard turbocharged 2.0-liter engine and twin-scroll turbocharged 2.3-liter engine available on the current model.

The 2.0-liter makes 245 hp and 275 pound-feet of torque; while the 2.3-liter makes 285 hp and 305 pound-feet of torque.



Each powertrain comes in a two- or all-wheel-drive option.

The MKC is included in Lincoln's pickup and delivery service; which is standard on all models. It can be accessed through the Lincoln Way app; which also allows customers to start, lock, unlock and locate their vehicle.

The 2019 Lincoln MKC will be available third quarter 2018. Pricing hasn't been announced, but considering current prices, it should start at around \$35,000 and go up from there.

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In 1942, the St. Louis Cardinals overlooked Berra in favor of his boyhood best friend, Joe Garagíola. On the surface, the Cardinals seemed to think that Garagiola was the superior prospect, but team presídent Branch Rickey actually had an ulterior motíve: Knowing he was soon to leave St. Louis to take over the operation of the Brooklyn Dodgers and more impressed with Berra than he let on, Ríckey apparently planned to hold Berra off untíl he could sign him for the Dodgers. However, the Yankees signed Berra for the same \$500 bonus (\$7,329 in current dollar terms) the Cardinals offered Garagiola before Rickey could sign Berra to the Dodgers.

During World War II, Berra served in the U.S. Navy as a gunner's mate on the attack transport USS Bayfield during the D-Day invasíon of France. A Second Class Seaman, Berra was one of a six-man crew on a Navy rocket boat, firing machine guns and launching rockets at the German defenses at Omaha Beach. He was fired upon, but was not hit and later received several commendations for

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First Drive; 2018 Lincoln Navigator

I recently tested a top of the line Navigator Black Label loaded with those goodies. Here's what I found.

Owning a luxury car is not about how fast you go or how much you spend. It's about how special you feel — how many stories you can tell about your car.

Against all odds, Lincoln appears to have figured that out. The new 2018 Lincoln Navigator SUV is steeped in the knowledge, full of details you initially miss, only to find them delightful upon discovery.

I recently tested a top of the line Navigator Black Label loaded with those goodies.

Lincoln completely reworked the Navigator this year. It's new from stem to stern, from a high-strength steel frame to 30-way seats, Apple CarPlay and aluminum body panels.

Really, 30-way seats? Lincoln counts fore and aft for each cushion as two ways (misleading, perhaps), but even being able to adjust 15 things on a seat is crazy.

Those are big changes, but the things that will help most as the Navigator tries to claw back to the top of the luxury-SUV market are smaller touches an owner may not notice till they've had the big SUV for a few weeks. This includes diamond stitching on the inner side of a grab handle; laser-burned pinpricks in the Khaya wood trim. Khaya wood? Oh, that's African mahogany, don't you know, old chap? And if you don't, you just made the day of an owner who will be delighted to tell you all

about it.

The 2018 Navigator is also big, quiet and powerful. There are two models, the 210-inch-long Navigator and 221.9-inch long-wheelbase Navigator L. Prices start at \$72,055 and \$80,750, respectively.

Long-wheelbase models typically account for about 30 percent of Navigator sales. Black Label is Lincoln's top trim level. Black label vehicles come with special, high-end interiors and loaded with features like 20-speaker Revel audio.



I tested an all-wheel-drive regular-wheelbase Navigator Black Label with burgundy paint and interior trim. It stickered at \$95,375.

The 2018 model is the first all-new Navigator in more than a decade. It uses a high-strength steel frame similar to that of the Ford F-150 pickup, but adds an independent rear suspension – Lincoln's hallmark in this segment.

The suspension creates extra legroom for passengers in the third row of seats.

The Navigator is one of the rare SUVs that can accommodate adults in all three rows. The new one is a couple of inches longer than the 2017 model, but avoids looking oversized thanks to several horizontal lines running along its sides. Aluminum body panels are new and help reduce weight about 200 pounds from the outgoing model.

The Navigator is remarkably quiet for such a large SUV, thanks to active noise cancellation and suspension tuning that also delivers a smooth, cushioned ride.

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his bravery. During an interview on the 65th Anniversary of D-Day, Berra confirmed that he was sent to Utah Beach during the D-Day invasion, as well.

Following his military service, Berra played minor-league baseball with the Newark Bears, surprising the team's manager with his talent despite his short stature. He was mentored by Hall of Famer Bill Dickey; whose uniform number Berra took. He later said, "I owe everything I did in baseball to Bill Dickey."

Berra was called up to the Yankees and played his first game on September 22, 1946 — he played seven games that season and 83 games in 1947. He played in more than a hundred games in each of the following fourteen years. Berra appeared in fourteen World Series, including 10 World Series championships, both of which are records.

was selected to 18 AllStar Games (MLB held
two All-Star Games in
1959 through 1962.) He
won the American
League (AL) MVP
award in 1951, 1954, and
1955; Berra never fin-

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More 2018 Navigator

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Other mechanical features include a 450-hp 3.5L twin-turbo V6 that delivers an amazing 510 pound-feet of torque at just 3,000 rpm for smooth acceleration. A 10-speed transmission shifts quickly and seamlessly. The shifter is controlled by horizontal "piano key" switches placed low in the center stack.



The Black Label package on my test vehicle included deep red "burgundy velvet" paint and a matching interior. The leather seats and trim have contrasting stitching. Even the inner side of the front-door grab-handles have the same pattern stitches on their seams.

That's what designers call a "third read" feature. You're not likely to notice it in the showroom or the first week you own the car, but it catches your eye later, you'll nod and appreciate Lincoln's attention to detail.



Another feature that gets better the more you know about it are the highlights

in the deep red Khaya mahogany. As in all other cars, the wood is a thin veneer over a piece of metal. The highlights are created by using a laser to burn tiny holes in the wood. The holes get bigger, and the color of the underlying metal changes the longer the laser is focused on a single spot. The size and color of the dots change progressively as they move from one end of the piece of trim to the other.

The center console is exceptionally wide and accommodating, but it's covered in a single strip of wood from the large Khaya trees, so the grain flows uninterrupted from front to back.

The headliner is a suede-like material that looks and feels like the Alcantara luxury brands have used before, but it's Dynamica, from a new supplier because Alcantara doesn't make rolls of material wide enough to cover the roof of a Navigator.



A wide head-up display changes automatically when the driver adjusts the gauges below it, so as to not duplicate what you see on the instrument panel. While only the driver can see the HUD, another special feature is visible only to people outside the Navigator. The Lincoln badge on the grille lights up a soft blue-white when the car is running.

Features like that can become a laughing stock if they're associated with a dull, average vehicle, but Lincoln's attention to detail makes the 2018 Navigator anything but that. It announces itself as it arrives and lives up to the fanfare.

The 2018 Navigator will be available this December at your local Lincoln

The No. 8 was retired in 1972 by the Yankees, jointly honoring Berra and Bill Dickey, his predecessor as the Yankees' star catcher.

On August 22, 1988, Berra and Dickey were honored with plaques to be hung in Monument Park at Yankee Stadium. Berra's plaque calls him "A legendary

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Testing the 2015 Lincoln MKC EcoBoost

First Drive Report from Motor Trend October 2014 by Ron Kiino



Well, If Matthew McConaughey drives one...

By now, you've probably seen the TV spots of movie star Matthew McConaughey promoting the all-new Lincoln MKC crossover. Whether you believe McConaughey would actually drive a Lincoln — he says he's been driving one "long before anybody paid me to drive one" or for that matter, an MKC. It's easier to envision the Longhorn alum in a Navigator is beside the point. Clearly, the newly dubbed "Lincoln Motor Company" is attempting to attract Gen X and Y buyers, those 30- and 40somethings who not only relate to McConaughey and his films, but also have healthy incomes and, most likely, a family that necessitates a small luxury crossover, one of the fastest-growing segments in the auto biz. In other words, let's get non-traditional Lincoln buyers into this non-traditional Lincoln.

I must admit, seeing McConaughey behind the wheel of a Lincoln crossover just feels weird. To me, he'll always be Wooderson from "Dazed and Confused." I mean, who can forget him talking about his prized Chevy Chevelle. Good news for Lincoln is the MKC's got some muscle of its own, thanks to the new Eco-Boost borrowed from the 2015 Ford Mustang.

Displacing 2.3 liters, the single turbo I-4 develops 285 horsepower and 305 lb-ft in the MKC, slight drops from the Mustang's version of 310 horsepower and 320 lb-ft. Our all-wheel-drive MKC

2.3, weighing in at 4,045 pounds, zipped from 0 to 60 mph in 6.5 seconds, on its way to a quarter-mile time of 15.0 seconds at 91.1 mph — the same quartermile time put down by the BMW X4 xDrive28i. Wooderson's ol' 390horsepower Melba Toast likely would have been about a second quicker to the quarter, given that a 450-horse Chevelle SS that Hot Rod magazine tested back in May 1970 needed 13.4 seconds at 108.2 mph. Per Motor Trend associate editor Christian Seabaugh, "This 2.3 motor is potent as hell. The AWD MKC is really quick, really torquey and real confidenceinspiring. Feels more Focus ST than Escape Titanium." Alas, we found its sixspeed automatic underwhelming, making us wish for a more intuitive gearbox with a couple more gears. Per senior features editor Jonny Lieberman, "The transmission feels lazy; which is too bad because the 2.3-liter with a great transmission could be a very compelling product."



Speaking of compelling, the less powerful 2.0-liter MKC; which we tested in front-drive guise, proved less so. With 240 horsepower and 270 lb-ft motivating 3,866 pounds, it returned runs of 7.6 seconds to 60 and 15.9 seconds at 87.4 mph in the quarter — respectable, but not nearly as engaging or fun as the 2.3. In our handling and braking tests, the 2.0 again proved respectable — 0.80 g max lateral acceleration, a 27.9-second figure-eight run, and 60 to 0 in 123 feet — but not as stout as the 2.3; which recorded 0.84 g, 26.7 seconds, and 118 feet, respectively. While editor-in-chief Ed Loh

Based on his style of speaking, Yogi was named "Wisest Fool of the Past 50 Years" by The Economist maga-

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viewed the FWD 2.0 as "tight and well-damped, with a surprising mix of smooth and sporty," the AWD 2.3 was rated higher and is the way to go if you're looking for the utmost performance from your Lincoln crossover, especially off the pavement. As editor at large, Angus MacKenzie noted, "The continuously variable torque split, all-wheel-drive system works extremely well on the dirt. The AWD MKC strolled up the dirt hill from a standing start, and proved fast and flickable through the dusty turns."



The MKC's exterior design, a blend of Lincoln heritage up front, Audi Q5 in the back, and Ford Escape in profile, received mostly rave reviews. According to MacKenzie, "Exterior styling is mature and pleasant. The wing-grille stays the right side of parody and the Audi Q5-style rear hatch (same style of cutlines to the side) gives the rear end graphic a broad, expansive stance." Loh had this to add, "Exterior is stunning. Best modern Lincoln styling to date."

From behind the wheel, the MKC was deemed a legitimate luxury player. Our editors were impressed with the quality of the wood, leather, and plastics, as well as, the clean, appealing and uncluttered design. Per MacKenzie, "The interior is extremely well executed, with acres of soft-touch leather — including a modern take on quilted door panels — nicely restrained open-pore wood, and soft-sheen aluminum. It looks refined and upscale."

In terms of value, our FWD 2.0

started at \$33,995, but thanks to a \$6,935 Reserve 102A Package (leather/heated/ cooled seats, 10-way power front passenger seat, auto-folding side-view mirrors, panoramic roof, navigation, hands-free liftgate, blind-spot system and 18-inch polished wheels among other items), a \$2,235 Technology Package (adaptive cruise control, active park assist, forward sensing system and lane-keep assist), a \$995 THX audio system, and a few other options, the as-tested price swelled to \$45,785. That's a lot of dough for a fancy Escape, but there's no denying that it includes a ton of kit, much of it useful and appreciated. Associate road test editor, Carlos Lago, observed, "I like the lanekeep assist philosophy: Doesn't alert everyone in the car; it just vibrates the wheel and subtly pulls in the right direction." Not surprisingly, the AWD 2.3 came with a steeper sticker price — \$37,630 to start and with similar options as the 2.0, \$49,265 as tested. For context, the 2015 Q5 3.0T starts at \$45,825.



Whether McConaughey's advertisements work magic for the MKC remains to be seen — certainly given the crossover just went on sale. But in August alone, the MKC found 1,760 takers, not that far off the 2,023 folks who bought a BMW X3. Clearly, the MKC is off to a good start. To that, I've got to think Wooderson would've said, "All right, all right, all right."



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zine in January 2005.

Berra married Carmen Short on January 26, 1949. They had three sons and were longtime resídents of Montclaír, New Jersey until his wífe's declining health caused them to move into a nearby assisted living facility. Carmen Berra died on March 6, 2014, of complications from a stroke, the couple having recently celebrated their 65th anniversary. Following Carmen's death, the house in Montclair was listed for sale at \$888,000, a reference to Yogí's uníform number.

Berra died at age 90 of natural causes in his sleep in West Caldwell, New Jersey, on September 22, 2015 - 69 years to the day after his MLB debut.

Berra's funeral services were held on September 29 and were broadcast by the YES Network. He was interred at the Gate of Heaven Cemetery in East Hanover, New Jersey.


