As most of you know, and much to Mary's dismay, I spend many hours of otherwise productive time on the Internet looking for cars and communicating with other Lincoln aficionados all over the world. Bargains abound on the Internet, and it is the source of valuable information on quality collector cars and also a good reason for not doing anything constructive.

Some time ago, I learned from one of my Internet sources, that during the late 60's or early 70's, the Lincoln Division of the Ford Motor Company commissioned the development of an automobile that was supposed to be be one of the finest designed and constructed vehicles since the Continental Mark II. Like the original Marks and the Mark II, it was to feature a pleasing and timeless design and only the finest of materials and interior appointments. To be seen driving one, the owner would be instantly identified as a person on the cutting edge of fashion, but with a tie to the past, the era of power, quality and elegance. I managed to learn that Lincoln had a special chassis constructed and shipped over to one of the great European coachbuilders for the installation of the custom body. Virtually nothing exists in print about this remarkable conveyance. From time to time, rumors would surface, and people would claim that the car had been seen either in France, Germany, Belgium or England during it's extensive test period. The intent was definitely a vehicle of European flavor. And at the time, much smaller than the current American offerings, it was to be a forerunner to the Granada based Versailles, or perhaps a worthy competitor to the first generation Cadillac Seville of the 1976-7 period.

Much to my amazement, during one recent late night, while cruising the electronic highway, I stumbled across what might be the find of the century. The one of a kind, the covered like new classic in the barn, the low mileage classic envied by all. The long forgotten special Lincoln, the car I had dreamed about for years had finally surfaced once again. I quickly contacted the present owner, who indicated that he had acquired the vehicle from the estate of a somewhat reclusive gentleman by the name of John Beresford Tipton, who apparently had a great deal of money at one time and was in the habit of giving it away to strangers. It is also believed that he also went by the names of Paul Frees and Boris Badanov at various times in his life.

In 1902, only one year after Willis Haviland Carrier graduated from Cornell University with a Masters in Engineering, the first air conditioning was in operation, making one Brooklyn printing plant owner very happy. Fluctuations in heat and humidity in his plant had caused the dimensions of the printing paper to keep altering slightly, enough to ensure a mísalign*ment of the colored* inks. The new air conditioning machine created a stable environment and aligned fourcolor printing became possíble. All thanks to the new *employee at the Buf*falo Forge Company, who started on a salary of only \$10.00 per week.

The "Apparatus for Treating Air" granted in 1906, was the first of several patents awarded to Willis Haviland Carrier. The recognized "father of air conditioning" is Carrier, but the term "air

(Continued from page 3) conditioning" actually originated with textile engineer, Stuart H. Cramer. Cramer used the phrase "air conditioning" in a 1906 patent claim filed for a device that added water vapor to the air in textile plants—to condition the yarn.

In 1911, Carríer dísclosed his basic Rational Psychrometríc Formulae to the American Society of Mechanical Engineers. The formula stíll stands today as the basis for the air conditioning industry. Carrier said he received his "flash of geníus" whíle waiting for a train. It was a foggy níght and he was going over in his mind the problem of temperature and humidity control. By the time the train arrived. Carrier had an understanding of the relationship between temperature, humidity and dew poínt.

Willis Carrier and six other engineers formed the Carrier **Engineering** Corporation in 1915 with a

conducted extensive ballistic testing at independent labs to validate the ballistic performance of their materials.

This vehicle has been under development for nearly two years and addresses the growing global demand for armored protection products. With its body-on-frame construction and higher gross vehicle weight capabilities, the Town Car was a natural first choice for Ford Motor Company.

The Lincoln Town Car BPS delivers a high standard level of ballistic protection. With this protection comes the ability to neutralize bigger, faster heavier rounds. There is more power behind such shells, and they impact with more energy. With this class of ballistic threat are two main categories: bigger bullets that travel fast and smaller, piercing bullets that travel even faster. The Lincoln Town Car BPS is equipped to stop them both, in addition to the many handgun levels that other armoring companies address.

starting capital of \$35,000. The company was dedicated to improving air conditioning technology.

Cooling for human comfort began in 1924, noted the three Carrier centrifugal chillers installed in J.L. Hudson Department Store in Detroit. Shoppers flocked to the "air conditioned " store. The boom in human cooling spread from the department stores to the movie theaters, most notably the Rívolí Theater in New York, whose summer film business skyrocketed when it heavily advertised the cool comfort.

In 1928, Willis Carrier developed the first residential "Weathermaker", an air conditioner for private home use. The Great Depressíon and then WW2 slowed the nonindustrial use of Air conditioning. After the war, consumer sales started to grow again. The rest is history, cool and comfortable hístory.
