“It was a very good year”. It was a long time ago! I graduated from High School in 1960. Sure the Cold War was on, but life here was good. The economic advancements and the great cars of the 1950’s were reality. That fall, before I went into the US Navy for two years of active duty, I went to the show of new cars. Mesmerized I was. The 1961 Lincoln had to be the ultimate car. I was going to own a Lincoln!

Some how they let me into College with my marginal grades because I was an ex-serviceman. I studied a lot harder than the

gan. I read that 1969 was the last year for my favorite Lincoln series. October found me at a Detroit dealer looking at two-year old Lincolns. The Dealer’s personal demo car was a 1969 two door Lincoln Coupe with all the options. I loved the 69 Mark III but was too tall to fit. This car fit me. They wanted \$8200 and I wrote a big down payment check and offered \$5100. Weeks went by and I was ready to go pay their price, when they called and said, “come get your car”. Mesmerized, I was. I still have all my papers of the sale.

My parents, along with a lot of other people, thought I was crazy buying a new Lincoln. But I have had 150,000 miles of

Editors Message

Saturday morning, July 19th, was a bright sunny day for the caravan down to Rochester, MN, to visit the very interesting and rare collection of automobiles owned by Fred Trachsel. I calculated that if we went considerably over the speed limit, we would eventually catch up. Sure enough, about 20 minutes later, we began to see a very large object in the road ahead. It was Marlin Hansen and his son in their 1917 Pierce Arrow, bringing up the end of the line, and keeping up very well with the rest of the caravan. While it isn't often that you see fifty and sixty year old automobiles, just how often do you see an eighty-six year old open touring sedan moving so elegantly down the highway. It was truly a sight to behold, and a magnificent addition to our tour. While not a Lincoln, it is the kind of car that Lincoln might have made in 1917 if they had been making cars.

We arrived at our destination in Rochester without incident and on schedule. Fred and Ramona Trachsel are the proud owners of a 1917 Locomobile, beautifully restored by White Post Restorations, a 1931 Buick Roadmaster coupe, a 1915 Brewster Knight, with a sleeve valve engine, and a 1914 Ford speedster. All vehicles were in suburb condition, and any serious collector would be extremely happy to have any one in their collection. They do get driven, and the Buick just completed a trip to Iola and back without any malfunction. Both Fred and Ramona were very gracious hosts and provided us with a lot of information regarding their very fine automobiles. A Few Words About George Pierce And His Arrows....

In 1863 George N. Pierce (1846-1911) came to Buffalo from Friendsville, Pennsylvania at the age of seventeen. He married into a well-to-do local family, and ten years and several jobs later, he partnered with two local men and formed a company known as Heinz, Pierce and Munshaser for the manufacture of refrigerators, birdcages, iceboxes and bathtubs.

Pierce was a partner until 1878 when he left the firm to establish a rival concern under the name of George N. Pierce & Company, and in 1888 added a line of children's tricycles, a product that was becoming very popular at the time. In an 1895 catalog, five models of "Queen" tricycles were offered for sale. The smallest, with a 16 inch wheel, for girls 3-5 years old, sold for \$5.00, or \$8.50 with rubber tires; the largest, with a

is a 1917 Pierce Arrow. I guess I've owed it all my life as my Dad bought it in 1942 when I was one year old. Actually I think I belong to it! It too is fun to drive but requires a lot more attention to drive in traffic than a modern car. Yet we feel like we experience more of the journey and it makes traveling an adventure.

In 1992, after spending eight years going through all the machinery of this old car, we began taking summer vacations in it. In 1998 we drove to the National Pierce Arrow meet in Seattle, Washington. My kids still talk about going over the Rocky Mountains in the Pierce. We usually only drive 400 miles a day. Last year we headed home from Kalamazoo, Michigan on I 94 at 7AM EST. At 400 miles it was 2PM CST in the middle of Wisconsin. My three kids were all asleep. With the hand throttle set at 60 mph the 13.5-liter engine turns 1200 rpm. I decided to go on home. The 618 miles took 12 hours of driving time. To date, our old "Road Locomotive" has never failed to bring us home.

Those of us that are lucky enough to have any type of old car we enjoy have an advantage. It can take us out of the daily grind and let us feel a little out of the ordinary.

32 inch wheel, for girls 8-15 years old, sold for \$12 or \$18 with rubber tires.

The earliest Pierce bicycles' nameplates used an arrow which was to become the familiar hallmark of all of Pierce's advertising and nameplates for decades to come.

"On May 1, George Pierce had an especially bright idea. The Buffalo inventor cranked up his Pierce Motorette, powered, as it were, by a one-cylinder de Dion engine and putt-putted to the grand opening of the Pan-American Exposition. Crowds parted, eyes popped and jaws dropped as the contraption clattered past the Machinery Building, in which several experimental automobiles produced by Pierce's rivals were on display, all shiny new but still." .. Nominations for Club Directors

At the July Board meeting we reviewed the Constitution and Bylaws for LCOC Regions concerning nominations and election of officers to the Northstar Region Board of Directors. The Motorette sold for \$950, and in 1901 and 1902 the company sold about two dozen autos. The Pierce Arrow, which featured a four cylinder Pierce engine, debuted in 1904, selling for \$4,000. By 1905, Pierce was producing some of the biggest and most expensive automobiles in the U.S. market.

The Pierce-Arrow Motor Car Co. was officially launched in 1907. Pierce resigned as president, and the Pierce family sold its interest and left the company. George Pierce was probably more of a bicycle person than an automobile person. Most of the greatest Pierce automobiles were actually made by the company bearing his mark and name after he had retired and died in 1910. Pierce had taken on George Birge as a partner in 1899, and Birge was president of the newly named auto company from 1908-1916. Even though George Pierce had passed from the scene, his principals of quality, however, were not compromised and obviously transferred to the renowned automobile. The company's prestige continued to grow in 1909 when President Taft ordered two Pierce-Arrows.

Pierce-Arrow affiliated with the Studebaker Corporation in 1928 in the hopes that the fortunes of both firms would prosper in the great economic times. With no high cost car of its own to sell, Studebaker purchased Pierce-Arrow for \$5.7 million in 1928 and formed what was then America's fourth-largest auto group after General Motors, Ford and Chrysler. Even though the union lasted only five years and is not recalled with fondness in Pierce-Arrow circles, Studebaker money spurred the introduction of the first Pierce straight eight engine and all time record sales of 9,840 in 1929. A V12 featuring the industry's first hydraulic valve lifters followed in 1932. The 1933 National Automobile Show at New York's Grand Central Palace witnessed the debut of a streamlined Silver Arrow sedan that dramatically forecast better days with its all steel roof, concealed running boards and turretlike double triangle rear window. The first of five Silver Arrows were completed in 3 months at the Studebaker plant in South Bend, Indiana and sold for \$10,000 each. At that price, few takers existed.

Although the Studebaker Corporation failed in 1933, a group of Buffalo businessmen led by George F. Rand Jr., bought control of the Pierce-Arrow operation and kept it open under the presidency of Arthur J. Chanter until 1938 when Pierce-Arrow also went bankrupt.
