For the present time, Lincoln is offering just four models in their lineup. The entry-level Corsair, the slightly larger Nautilus, the mid-sized Plus Aviator, and the very posh Navigator. Prices run from the mid-\$40s for the Corsair to over \$100K for a fully decked-out Navigator. So, in the scheme of things, Lincoln has something for almost everyone.

While I would like to see another sedan similar to the MKZ or the Continental, SUVs are what are selling now, and to stay in business, SUVs is what you will see in Lincoln showrooms for the foreseeable future. Times do change, and perhaps the pendulum will eventually swing back toward sedans once again.

We picked up two stories off the internet that seem to be favorable toward the Corsair. We think that, for the most part, they are fairly objective. We do have a few owned by members of the LCOC, and those that have them seem to think that they are pretty decent cars, capable of providing good value for the money. The turbo I4 engine does provide good gas mileage, with sufficient power to enable the Corsair to keep up with almost anything on the highway. Not a speed demon, but a good reliable, nice car. And, we would like to remind you that Lincoln of Bloomington does have a few in stock; stop by and try one out. I think that you will like it.

Jeff Bridges American Actor

Jeffrey Leon Bridges (born December 4, 1949) is an American actor. He is known for his leading man roles in film and television. In a career spanning over seven decades he has received various accolades, including an Academy Award, a Golden Globe, and a Screen Actors Guild Award in addition to nominations for three BAFTA Awards. In 2019, he was awarded the Cecil B. DeMille Award.

Born into a prominent acting family, Bridges appeared on the television series Sea Hunt (1958-1960) alongside his father, Lloyd, and brother, Beau. He gained fame for his roles in the dramas The Last Picture Show (1971) and Thunderbolt and Lightfoot (1974), which also earned him nominations for the Academy Award for Best Support-



ing Actor. As a leading man, he starred in the adventure film *King Kong* (1976); science fiction films Tron (1982) and Starman (1984), gaining a nomination for the Academy Award for Best Actor for the latter; thrillers Jagged Edge (1985) and The Morning After (1986); and dramas *The Fabulous Baker* Boys (1989), The Fisher King (1991) and The Mirror Has Two Faces (1996). Bridges starred in the leading role of *The Big Le*bowskí (1998), followed by several big-budget films: The Contender (2000), Seabíscuít (2003), Iron Man (2008), and *Tron:Legacy* (2010). Bridges received several Oscar nominations, including for The Contender and True Grit (2010). He won the Academy Award for Best Actor for his role as an alcoholic singer in Crazy Heart (2009). Bridges earned Primetime Emmy Awards nominations for his roles in the HBO film A Dog Year (2009), and the Hulu series *The* Old Man (2022).

Early life - Bridges was born on December 4, 1949, in Los Angeles, the son of actor Lloyd Bridges (1913-1998) and actress and writer Dorothy Bridges (1915-2009). He is one of four children: older brother Beau Bridges (born 1941), who is also an actor; a younger sister Lucinda; and a brother named Garrett, who died of sudden infant death syndrome in 1948. Corsaír, a great car in a smaller package

2023 Lincoln Corsair First Drive Review: Gimme back my buttons! But at least it has BlueCruise now. By Byron Hurd.

While 2023 brings only a refresh to the Lincoln Corsair, it's a fairly robust one. It loses an engine, gains BlueCruise and receives an interior overhaul featuring a new infotainment screen running the latest version of Sync

4. Corsair may be Lincoln's best-seller, but it competes against a variety of big-sellers in terms of both size and price. Take your pick from the likes of the Cadillac XT4, Audi Q3, Lexus NX or the BMW X1, just to name a select few; and soon they will be joined by Alfa Romeo's new Tonale, which lines up surprisingly well with the baby Lincoln.

Like virtually everything in its class, the 2023 Lincoln Corsair's standard engine is a 2.0-liter turbocharged four-cylinder, which in this case produces 250 horsepower and 275 pound-feet of torque. Gone is the previously available 2.3-liter upgrade that apparently wasn't popular.

For 2023, the only other option is therefore the returning plug-in hybrid model, which produces a reasonable (and carry-over) 266 horses. Unlike the Escape PHEV on which it's based, the plug-in Corsair comes stand-

ard with all-wheel drive. With just 16 more horsepower compared to the 2.0T and more than 560 additional pounds to motivate, it relies on the instant torque of its electric motors to get off the line with authority. Lincoln gave us the choice of sampling either the standard turbo-four or PHEV for our quick outing in the Corsair; we opted for the plug-in for symmetry with our 2021 outing.

As with virtually all midcycle updates, some exterior styling elements were updated or deleted. The grille is taller (and consequently larger) and is framed on the bottom by a new horizontal protrusion. PHEV models get a metallic foiling effect on the grille mesh. In the rear, it's business as usual.

Inside, the dash is redesigned around a new 13.2-inch touchscreen running Sync 4.0. Besides an updated user interface (more (Continued on page 6)

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was a commercial success, earning \$90 million
worldwide, more than
triple its \$23 million
budget, and also winning an Academy
Award for Best Visual
Effects.

In 1982, Bridges starred in one of his better-known roles in the science fiction film *Tron*, in which he played Kevin Flynn, a video game programmer. That same year, he starred in *Kiss Me Goodbye*, an Amerícan romantic comedy film directed by Robert Mulligan, with Sally Field. In 1984, he was nominated for the Academy Award for Best Actor for playing an alien in *Starman*. He also performed in the neo-noir Agaínst All Odds (1984), the thrillers Jagged Edge (1985) and *The Morning* After (1986), and the crime comedy *Nadine* (1987).

His role in *Fearless* (1993) is thought by some crítics to be one of his best performances. One crític dubbed it a masterpiece; Pauline Kael wrote that he "may be the most natural and least self-conscious screen actor that has ever lived". In 1994, he starred as Lt. Jímmy Dove in the action film Blown Away, opposite Tommy Lee Jones and Forest Whitaker, His real-life father Lloyd Bridges was also featured in the film, play-

on that later), the screen now houses virtually all of the media and climate controls that were previously located as buttons and knobs on the Lincoln's center stack. All that remains on the consequently shrunken stack is a single volume knob and various vehicle controls like max defrost, auto stop/start and the hazard lights. The start/stop button has also been relocated next to the piano-key transmission controls. Through all of that, Lincoln managed to make access to the enlarged media storage bin easier. Yay?

Perhaps the most significant change for the 2023 Corsair is the addition of Lincoln's highway hands-free driving suite. Originally launched on the Navigator and dubbed "ActiveGlide," the system has been renamed Lincoln BlueCruise for 2023 to align with Ford's nomenclature (and perhaps because "ActiveGlide" was a silly name). Specifically, it's BlueCruise 1.2 – the same, latest version rolling out throughout Ford's lineup. I didn't have the opportunity to test this thoroughly in the Corsair, but recently sampled the latest updates in a Ford Mustang Mach-E running the same software, and I'm pleased to report that it performs as advertised; look for an upcoming review for more on that.

Corsair occupies a space in the U.S. market where PHEV options are still the exception rather than the norm. It's low on power compared to other, slightly larger competitors such as the 304-horsepower Lexus NX 450+ and the 362-hp Audi Q5 PHEV. It also lacks the NX's electric range, offering just 28 miles on a charge versus 37. On paper, the forthcoming Alfa Romeo Tonale PHEV will match up nicely — it offers similar EV range (likely

about 30 miles) but aims for a more enthusiastoriented package.

While we've yet to drive the plug-in Alfa, your author *has* driven the mechanically similar 2024 Dodge Hornet R/T plug-in hybrid. Based on that, it seems likely that the Alfa will have a dynamic edge over the cushy Corsair, whether in turbo or hybrid guise. That's not an insult so much as an acknowledgment of their diverging approaches to luxury.

The Corsair's powertrain is plenty responsive around town, but its chassis leans more toward commuting in comfort than carving up back roads. When he drove the 2021 Corsair, News Editor Joel Stocksdale referred to its two suspension modes as "particularly soft and somewhat firmer"; nothing has changed. It's also surprisingly quiet inside for a hybrid; and frankly, quiet for something based on the Escape, which is not nearly so isolated from the outside world. That said, the 2.5-liter gas engine doesn't make a particularly pleasing sound; the Hornet (and by extension, Tonale) has the benefit of a turbocharger muffling the incoherent buzzing of its tiny four-pot. The most obvious nod to the Corsair's humble underpinnings is the seating position.

With nothing beyond business as usual to report from the chassis, that leaves us to focus on the 2023 Corsair's most significant interior upgrade: the new Sync 4 infotainment system.

Among its upsides are its responsiveness and attractive, versatile screen layout. It makes good use of its widescreen format, and individual screens can be resized to allow multiple features to be utilized simultaneously. The climate controls that once resided beneath the screen now live within it, occupying the bottom inch and a half or so for easy access at all times.

Take the radio tuning interface, for example, pictured above. When you tap to manually scroll through stations, the UI re-focuses the interface on the station selection. That's fine on its own, but when the focus changes, the station icons and tuning controls *move*. So, if you're trying to change stations while underway, you have to look back at the screen a *second time* in order to locate the tuning button all over again. So, not only is there nothing to physically feel, but you now have to hunt UI elements around the screen like some ridiculous game of whack-a-mole. Who thought this was a good idea?

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ing the uncle of Bridges' character. The film was not a financial success, managing to recoup \$30 million of its \$50 million budget at the box office, with its release a few weeks after another explosive-themed film, Speed. On July 11, 1994, Bridges received a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame for his contributions to the motion picture industry. The star is located at 7065 Hollywood Boulevard. In 1996, he co-starred with Barbra Streisand in The Mirror Has Two Faces. In 1998, he starred as what is arguably his most iconic role, The Dude, in the Coen brothers' film The Big Lebowskí.

In 2000, he received his fourth Academy Award nomination, for his role in The Contender. He also starred in the 2005 Terry Gilliam film Tideland, his second with the director (the first being 1991's The Fisher King alongside Robin Williams). He shaved his trademark mane of hair to play the role of Obadiah Stane in the 2008 Marvel comic book adaptation Iron Man. In July 2008, at the San Diego Comic-Con International, he appeared in a teaser, reprising his 1982 fan-favorite role of Kevin Flynn for Tron: Legacy, shot as concept footage for director Joseph Kosinskí; this developed into a full 3D feature release in 2010.

There's one more update to cover for 2023: the price. With MSRPs skyrocketing all over the industry, it's no surprise that the Corsair's redesign coincides with a higher cost. Each trim has increased by almost exactly \$2,000, including the base price going up to \$40,085. Hey, at least we got a redesign with it. All told, our loaded Grand Touring tester rang the till at nearly \$65,000. Like the Escape on which it is based, the Corsair gets expensive with options. Even at its base price of \$55,280, the Grand Touring (which is PHEV-only) ain't cheap. That's \$10 grand more expensive than the Tonale. But unlike the Italian-built Alfa Romeo, the Corsair PHEV is eligible for tax credits.

But for all of the comparisons to Alfa, Lincoln's singular focus on comfort-oriented luxury makes them a poor match for each other. Up against the Lexus NX, though, I'd have to give the nod to the Corsair. Its refined powertrain, smooth ride, more user-friendly tech and absence of sporting pretense make for a more coherent, appealing package. But for the love of all things holy, stop taking all of our buttons!

2023 Lincoln Corsair First Drive Review: All Good Things Come With A Price - A mild freshening for Lincoln's smallest product hides impressive tech and active safety changes, including hands-free driving, but at a dear price. By: Brandon Turkus.

VERDICT - 8.9/10 - My boomer parents love Lincoln. They just wrapped up a lease of a 2020 Corsair and are now on to a Nautilus. They like the style and comfort, and the fact that the seats adjust automatically to a preset position. And they really don't much care that it's a Ford with a shiny nose, because after years of owning mainstream crossovers and pickup trucks, to them, Lincolns represent luxury.

But like most Millennials, my parents are not the tech savvy sort, and when I told them I'd talk them through their new car's adaptive cruise control and other active safety systems, their response was "Well, we don't need that." And then when I then told them I was testing the refreshed and BlueCruise-equipped 2023 Lincoln Corsair, their response was "Oh, don't use hands-free driving!"

My parents need not have worried. Blue-Cruise and the Corsair are natural partners, and the active safety system's addition makes this compact luxury CUV better and more relevant than ever before. But while my parents might shy away from hands-free driving, they won't be alone – adding the tech to the Corsair demands a pretty penny.

Set Course And Engage - The biggest new item on the 2023 Corsair is Lincoln BlueCruise. Yes, I said BlueCruise. The hands-free driver-assist system has a new name after a single year under the ActiveGlide banner, and I'm just glad people will stop sniggering when they hear it. I understand Ford and Lincoln's desire to distinguish the premium version of this system from the mainstream (even if the only difference between the two is the vehicle they're attached to) but, generally speaking, names that remind people of bedroom paraphernalia are a bad choice.

Fortunately, BlueCruise remains pretty slick. The latest version, 1.2, is available on all three Corsair trims as part of the top-end Collection III package, although customers

can't select BC independently of that pricey group. My most recent experience with the system, at the launch of the 2022 F-150 Lightning, was a mixed bag – the system rarely required intervention, but it pingponged annoyingly between lane markers. But while BlueCruise has generally felt inferior to General Motors' Super Cruise suite, version 1.2 is a big step forward.

Where the Lightning bounced from side to side, the Corsair's new In-Lane Positioning system, standard in BlueCruise 1.2, kept it mostly centered. The system will still move the Corsair in its lane, but now it's in response to adjacent traffic – come up next to a semi on the right and BlueCruise will push the car to the left side of the Corsair's lane. This behavior feels natural in itself, like the sort of thing a human driver would do.

In-Lane Positioning helped on gentler turns, too, allowing the Corsair to negotiate them with confidence. The car provided plenty of warning in the one case where it needed to disengage, too, showing off its onhighway geofencing as it deactivated ahead of a particularly tricky bit of I-75 that saw traffic merging into both outside lanes on a left-hand bend (A hands-free-equipped Mach -E disengaged for me in the exact same spot, which makes be believe it's an intentional reaction).

And if the computer deems a curve too sharp, BlueCruise 1.2 can now reduce speed to get through it. But like other automakers that offer a similar system for sharp highway bends, the Corsair slows too much and too

suddenly. I found it simpler to simply tap the brakes to deactivate the system and navigate the corner myself.

Hands Off My Lincoln: The most impressive addition in BC 1.2 is the automatic lane-change system, which along with the stronger lane-centering puts this version of the hands-free driving software on more even footing with Super Cruise (although GM is starting to roll out a version of the tech that works while towing, which Ford still doesn't have an answer for).

The system won't execute lane changes on its own, like a GMC Hummer EV, although it will suggest one if the conditions are right. The system works here as it does in Mercedes and GM products, requiring a simple flick of the turn-signal stalk to get things going. Once the car recognizes that the lane is open, it slides over with little delay. It was pretty much faultless during a weekend of testing.

Red Alert, On Screen - Lincoln has done some great things with its interior color schemes since launching the Navigator SUV and the Black Label line, and while the Corsair is neither quite as ambitious as its big brother or available with as luxurious a fitment, it's still better for 2023. The Eternal Red upholstery (one of two new upholstery shades) is bold and exciting, matching up exclusive aluminum accents with thoughtful contrast stitching. It's a far better shade than the blacks, grays, and tans that usually accompany compact luxury vehicles.

Lincoln focused the hardware changes for the 2023 Corsair's cabin on the center stack, which adopts a new 13.2-inch land-scape-oriented touchscreen (hooray!) while ditching physical buttons and knobs for the climate controls (boooooo!). Aesthetically, this is a winning arrangement.

The polarizing tablet-stapled-to-dashboard look remains, but the larger screen is a far better fit for the Corsair's dash shape, which shows off a fat stack of trim and leather while using negative space to give a sense of depth. The cleaner console below it retains the PRND selector, a volume knob, and a couple quick-access buttons, but it's overall a far cleaner, more mature arrangement.

Functionally, things are less good. While this is Sync 4 - a system my colleagues and I have praised on a bunch of different occasions – Lincoln's decision to integrate the

climate settings at the bottom of the screen, where the page icons for the media, navigation, phone, etc. live on other Sync 4-equipped vehicles, makes the whole system more cumbersome. In order to get from, say, the navigation to the radio page, the Corsair requires an additional input. I also had trouble getting between the native infotainment and the Apple CarPlay interface (wireless connectivity is standard, though).

Givin' Her All She's Got - Were you waiting for the 2023 facelift to add a Corsair with its punchy turbocharged 2.3-liter to your garage? Bad news for you, as Lincoln is dropping the more powerful of its two gas engines this year, citing a low take rate and overall consumer preference. The lone gas engine, featured in my tester, is a turbocharged 2.0-liter four-cylinder that pumps out a respectable 250 horsepower and 275 pound-feet of torque.

While that's down on the 2.3's 295 ponies and 310 lb-ft, the Corsair continues to come with more standard horsepower and torque than turbocharged 2.0-liter Audi Q5, BMW X3, and Cadillac XT4 (although the rivals from Acura, Alfa Romeo, and Mercedes-Benz pack more oomph). The plug-in-hybrid Grand Touring model remains as well, for folks who want an electrified offering.

The 2.0-liter Corsair is a tough little thing, with plenty of torque off the line and little in the way of turbo lag. It revs willingly and still feels strong even at higher engine speeds. The attached eight-speed automatic is a champ, blending into the background in everyday driving and responding willingly to sudden demands for a lower gear. The arrangement isn't overly thrifty, though, as the 2023 Corsair returns just 21 miles per gallon city, 29 highway, and 24 combined with all-wheel drive. It's not the least efficient four-

cylinder in the class (that distinction goes to the turbocharged 2.5-liter Genesis GV70), but it's not far off.

The handling experience is nothing to write home about either. The steering is vague and the body motions liberal, although the ride quality and low overall NVH levels more than make up for the uninterested cornering. That should suit the average Lincoln consumer just fine.

That's also true of the price tag. The Corsair starts at \$40,085, including a \$1,395 destination charge, with all-wheel drive adding \$2,300 to the price tag. Even at \$42,385, though, the Corsair is several thousand dollars cheaper than almost all its all-wheel-drive-equipped competitors. Only the \$39,990 Cadillac XT4 undercuts the Corsair. Entries from Audi, BMW, Mercedes-Benz, Genesis, and Acura demand anywhere from \$1,600 (in the case of the RDX) to \$6,800 (X3 xDrive30i) more.

But base prices tell only part of the story. Parking a Corsair Reserve with BlueCruise in the driveway is a different story, though. The Reserve trim with all-wheel drive starts at \$46,770, and BlueCruise is only available as part of the \$10,730 Collection III package. In addition to hands-free driving, owners will score a panoramic sunroof, head-up display, heated rear seats, and a fantastic Revel audio system, not to mention all the goodies from the Collection II pack, but there's no escaping the frankly huge markup. Collection II demands just \$2,940 more than the base Reserve, for crying out loud.

That sums up the primary issue with the most impressive version of the new Corsair – it's expensive in its best form (\$60,685 in the case of my tester). Where a lightly optioned X3 or GLC or Stelvio will keep you happy while ultimately doing less to wow than a loaded Corsair, I can't say I'd be quite as happy in a Lincoln without BlueCruise. The topend package brings almost too much to the table, to the point that ordering it feels more like a prerequisite for purchase than an actual option.

That's probably good news for Lincoln, because I have to imagine the profit margin on a \$10,000 option pack is pretty spectacular. But for consumers, well, they're going to be left wondering if BlueCruise is really worth the expense. Maybe my parents have the right idea.

Bridges studied piano at a young age, strongly encouraged by his mother. 

Phílanthropy - In 1984, Bridges and other entertainment industry leaders founded the End Hunger Network aimed at encouraging, stimulating and supporting action to end childhood hunger. He supported President Obama's initiative to End Childhood Hunger by 2015. In November 2010, Brídges became spokesman for the No Kid Hungry campaign of the organization Share our Strength. Its goal is to present and undertake a stateby-state strategy to end childhood hunger in the United States by 2015. Bridges also supports environmental causes and organizations such as the Amazon Conservation Теат.
