Additionally, the trunk lining has been replaced, the power antenna rebuilt along with the radio and windshield wiper motor. The radiator and power steering have also been reconditioned. (Charlie reports that the power steering was a nightmare to do) The steering wheel has also been recast. The door panels are about the only

More on Edsel Ford

History points out that Edsel long suffered at the hands of hís father, Henry. Frustration and suppressed anger make a poor recipe for good health and long lífe. Not surprísíngly, Edsel fell víctím to ulcers. Early in 1942, he underwent abdominal surgery. Ten months later, he was hospítalízed again, this time for Undulant Fever. *Eventually the doc*tors discovered that hís ulcers had become cancerous. and his condition was deemed inoperable. He was sent home to die.

Henry Ford refused to admít the truth about hís son's condítíon. "It was all due to Edsel's high flying lifestyle" he saíd. "If Edsel would stop smoking or eat a proper diet, or go see other doctors, hís health should ímprove". On May 26th, 1943, in the early morníng Edsel Ford díed at a early age of 49.

Ford Celebrates 100 years....

Ford is commemorating one of the 20th century's most fascinating business stories with the approach of its 100th anniversary on June 16th. From its humble beginnings in a converted Detroit wagon shop and \$28,000 in cash, Ford Motor Company grew to put the world on wheels with the Model T and today is a global network of manufacturing plants and dealerships in more than 200 markets on six continents.

Come to the Ford Dearborn proving grounds during the celebration and see some of the Ford airplanes that started the commercial aviation industry, including the famous Ford Tri-Motor. You can view the airplane hangar and runway used by Charles Lindberg during his tenure as Ford Motor Company's Chief Test Pilot. Also learn about Ford's role in America's victory in WW II, including production of the Ford B-24 Liberator so instrumental in the effort over Europe. Take home a photograph of you and your family superimposed with one of these famous airplanes to commemorate your visit to this historic Ford Motor Company site. (Continued from page 3) This story might have had a different ending if Edsel had been able to stand up to his stubborn father, demanding that he be allowed to run the Company without interference. But Edsel was Edsel, putting the feelings of others before his own.

Edsel did make an impact during his short life, though:

For years Edsel Ford was one of the largest donors to the Detroit Community fund.

A talented landscape artist in his own right, Edsel served for many years as President of the Detroit Arts Commission.

It was Edsel who influenced his father to take over the bankrupt Lincoln Motor Company, saving one great car from the fate of so many during the '30's.

Edsel was the kind of parent who always was there, sharing the joys and

problems of his children. Edsel's final *irony was the fact* that the car that was intended by his family to do him honor turned out to be unsuccessful in the marketplace. And, yes, on his father. In the end, it was Edsel who persuaded the old man to replace the model "T", to mechanize his windshield wipers, to adopt-finallyhydraulic brakes, to engage in some semblance of long range planning and to make peace with organízed labor.

Edsel was responsible for many good things in the Company's history- Insístance on verve and dash in product styling, on a reliable and safer product, on fair and courteous relationships with dealers and the public. He possessed an unquenchable sense of fítness, an insistence on doing the right thing. Wíthout hím, the *Company might* never have attained the solid image it is today. He did all the essential things that Henry refused to do and consequently held the *Company together* during several crises periods in the 1930's.
