Doc was my navy blue colored 1992 Lincoln Continental which ran superb and served me proud, but age was showing in annoying ways. Ways such as the digital messaging system chiming at times telling me to "CHECK DCL," and oil pressure. There was never anything wrong other than a ridiculous computer issue. And if any of my other Brother and Sister Lincoln owners had an early 90's Continental, you don't need me to remind you of all of the wrongs involving the air ride suspension system. Hell, it got to the point I was buying spares two at a time, front and rear, to keep on hand. This was no easy task either! I had to order them up from salvage yards as far south as Louisiana. 

Earl "Mad Man" Muntz
1914 - 1987

Mad Man Earl Muntz made his start in life in the mid 30's as a used car salesman in Illinois. In the early 40's, Muntz moved his operation to Glendale, California. This was the beginning of the most colorful, outrageously successful merchandising promotion in the history of used cars. Earl Muntz was in the right place (Los Angeles) at the right time (1941). During the war years, he became the biggest used car dealer in the world. By 1947 Earl had continued in his command of the used car market, but had taken on the largest Kaiser-Frazer dealership in the U.S. In 1947 alone he sold \$72,000,000 worth of new and used cars. Muntz sold 22,000 new K-F cars that

The "Madman" aspect of his personality gained nationwide attention when Earl hired a young advertising man by the name of Mike Shore. Shore started a flamboyant radio and billboard campaign in L.A. that has never been surpassed. Such quotes as "I WANT TO GIVE THEM AWAY, BUT MRS. MUNTZ WON'T LET ME.....SHE'S CRAAAZY.....I BUY 'EM RETAIL, SELL 'EM WHOLESALE - MORE FUN THAT WAY." "" YOU TOO CAN BE A WEALTHY PEDESTRIAN." "JUST SOUND YOUR HORN, WE PAY BY EAR."

An interesting sideline about Muntz was that his real love was not even cars. Muntz was a hell of an inventor, and his true interests were with anything that had to do with electronics...hence the Muntz T.V.

In the late 40's Muntz designed a set that was much simpler than his competitors. Since he

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sold millions of them cheaper, fortunes skyrocketed. Meanwhile, Muntz had a falling out with Henry Kaiser and decided to look into building a car of his own. In 1950 he answered an ad on a Lincoln for sale by a man named Frank Kurtis. Frank was a leading builder of Indianapolis and dirt track race cars. What Muntz ended up buying was a very interesting sports car that Frank had been playing with for the past several years. Muntz was so impressed the he ended up buying the tools, dies and assests of the Kurtis firm. Kurtis stayed on with the project and he and Sam Hanks redesigned the original car to make it more acceptable to a greater number of buyers. Muntz named his car the Muntz Road Jet. 1954 was not a good year for the Mad Man. His T.V. company had not prepared for the advent of color and was failing. He had also purportedly lost \$1000 on every one of his Jets. He went into Chapter 11. Five years later,

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Would you fellas like to look at it?" We took the short drive to the giant intake lot and there she was. My test drive proved that this Lincoln was no disappointment and needed nothing. It had an impeccable service record and the interior was the most gorgeous buttercream leather color I have ever seen. Scott made a dealer folly when telling me that they would want between \$5,000 and \$6,000 for the car. We drove it into the detail shop as I offered \$5,000 and Scott verified the offer with the Sales Manager. The offer was accepted and after completing the sale she was shiny and clean waiting and warm.

"Butter" was my first Lincoln Town Car and for the next 7 months I would enjoy all that she had to offer. I had to replace a water pump and alternator during my time with her and considered myself fortunate. On a very late evening in August of 09' I was traveling west to Mankato, MN when a buck had shot out of the ditch and gave me no time to brake. There was a crippled Butter now needing a headlight assembly, hood, fender, grill, and bumper cover. After processing my claim with the insurance company, I had no idea that even after market Lincoln parts were so expensive. My claims representative was totaling my car but giving me full book value for it.

As disappointed and downtrodden as I felt, I made \$1,200 on the loss and started yet another Town Car shopping experience. I checked nationally for my dream Town Car and was willing to fly out if I had to. Remember that black dream Town Car I referred to? I found one in Illinois, and one in Tennessee. The Illinois dealer told me it was sold but took my information as sales do fall

through. After more digging I found my dream Lincoln being sold for \$5,500 in Anoka, MN. I called the gentleman and told him, "You have my dream car! If all is cool on it I want to buy it and I will get the loan tomorrow!" Jerry was the sellers name and he sold insurance for a living. Jerry told me he had never sold a car to someone without seeing it first but did declare that he was being honest and fair with me about its spotless maintenance record.

Jerry said, "I bought it brand new in Nebraska in 1999. I have used synthetic oil in it ever since and it needs nothing but a good owner like yourself. I have two other new Town Cars and this one just sits in my garage. If the car means that much to you, give me \$4,000 cash and it's yours." I was on my way to meet Jerry two days later to check out this gorgeous tuxedo with tires. Everything on it worked and was in great operating condition during the test drive. While on the test drive, the dealership in Illinois told me that their sale fell through but I was happy to decline the offer. This was the happiest purchase I have ever made in my lifetime and I cannot count my house because that wasn't fun to buy.

"Licorice" is a 1999 Cartier Edition Town Car with a carriage roof and black in color. It has gray colored leather interior and the original Ford factory cellular phone inside the arm rest. My girlfriend at the time and I spent that Friday evening driving through the North Metro with the windows down and the sunroof open. So many memories of our time together traveling exist in that car even though

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however, Muntz invented the 4-track tape player and went on to make yet a second million. All-in-all, Muntz made and lost 3 fortunes. He often said that "I never minded losing a fortune, 'cause it was so damn much fun making the next." His later ventures included Muntz Motor Mansions, Muntz Motorcycle Park in Simi Valley, and of course Muntz big screen T.V.s. When Muntz purchased the assets of the Kurtis Company in 1950, he also got Frank Kurtis' genius in the deal. Muntz, Kurtis and race car driver Sam Hanks put their heads together to redesign the car to give it a broader base of appeal to the buying public. During this time 29 two-passenger cars were produced from aluminum. They were basically unchanged from the Cadillac powered Kurtises except for the gadgets Muntz added. Muntz, along with Mike Shore, used their advertising genius to promote the car way beyond its prominence. A 1950 road test of the Muntz Jet published in *Sports Cars* magazine had this to say about the "Road Jet": "When

Squint your eyes when you look at Lincoln's Town Car and you can see hints of a classic Jaguar sedan in its mouth-shaped grille, sharply rounded roofline and curved taillights.

The Town Car is classically American, too, and much bigger than any Jag would ever be. It uses a full-perimeter frame, separate body, single-overhead-cam (SOHC) V8 engine and rear-wheel drive.

Last year it underwent a complete redesign and was cloaked with a body that is a vast departure from the upright and angular look of its predecessor. Some traditionalists may miss the old car, with its pillow-soft ride, gargantuan trunk and a nose that bobbed over bumps like the bow of a ship at sea, but most folks will find the new car's youthful look and tighter handling more appealing.

The redesigned Town Car is one prong of a three-product strategy aimed at attracting younger buyers. The Navigator SUV and the mid-size Lincoln sports sedan, due for debut later this year, are the other two. Since the entire car was reworked last year, upgrades to the Town Car for 1999 have been incremental, with one exception: Side airbags are now mounted in the front seats.

On the Executive series, door panels get wood trim and the front armrest contains a storage bin. Rear armrests have cup holders. Power seat controls are now on the door instead of the

seat, and a two-tone paint scheme is offered.

Our test car was a refrigerator-white Cartier model, with bone colored leather seats and wood grain trim on the dash. The wood grain trim adds liveliness and warmth to the broad, flat expanse of the instrument panel, which has very little sculpting in order to preserve the three-across capability of the front bench seat. The instrumentation was a jarring combination of white-on-black gauges and bright-green digital readouts for fuel and odometer. The electro-luminescent, round-gauge panel from the Continental would seem more appropriate for a car in this price category.

The radio is located high in the center of the dash, a long reach for me, but auxiliary controls on the steering wheel made change stations or volume a simple move of my finger on the wheel.

Six can sit inside the Town Car, although most folks won't squeeze themselves quite that tight very often. The seats, both front and back, are broad and accommodating. The trunk has 20.1 cubic feet, but taking full advantage of it is tricky because the spare tire partially blocks access. With careful packing it will hold a reasonable amount of luggage, just don't plan on carrying a large box back there.

Mirroring the change to a more youthful exterior, the Town Car's driving dynamics have undergone a similar transformation. The ride is

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 we test-drove car #6 we used a stopwatch for the pickup figures. Example: 0 - 80 in 9 seconds. On the turn-pike, 125 with still a little left to go. The car rides well, corners well and stays on an even-keel. Finish, is high-quality throughout and the instrument panel has everything by way of dials. After the initial 29 were built, the company moved to Evanston, Illinois where Muntz, Hanks and Kurtis unveiled their "new improved" model. They lengthened the car 13" to accept a rear seat, thus the first "sports car" which would seat 4. Because of typical General Motors arrogance towards small auto companies, Muntz was unable to sell his car with the Cadillac engine unless he disguised it. Luckily, Muntz had a special relationship with Benson Ford and was not only able to buy parts from Ford, but Ford also agreed to allow new Muntz cars to be serviced by local Ford Dealers. The revamped Muntz now came with a flathead Lincoln engine and

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"Hydramatic" transmission as well as Ford suspension, windows and many other items.

Muntz might have had an in with Ford since he gave Ford a new Muntz.

It was rumored that Ford got a lot of ideas from that Muntz for their upcoming sports car, the Thunderbird. Many of the other innovations Muntz placed on his car were unheard of in the American auto industry at that time. Each car was equipped with a padded dash board and seat belts (unfortunately affixed to the seat.). Survivors of the company say that, "The seat belts were strictly a gimmick, since if you were going to name a car a jet, you better have seat belts." Muntz had a few innovations of his own. He invented a console between the front seats and placed a Motorola radio in it. He actually

Muntz, being a flamboyant character, attracted that type of clientele. Most of the cars he sold were to the Hollywood crowd. Each tried to outdo the other with a more outlandish Muntz than their friend's. The rare Muntz is one that is a sedate color and interior. Pink, heliotrope, chartreuse, purple and bright lemon yellow were accented with such interior fabrics as snake skin, emu, alligator, leopard and many others. The final absurdity came when a radio personality in Chicago who had a boat fetish, had Muntz "deck" over the back seat area with mahogany planks, just like his boat. The car was then finished in a

Editors note: We will be looking forward to meeting and visiting with Jeff at one of our Northstar events this summer. This model Lincoln has been in production for about 12 years and many of our club members have owned them over this period of time. These are incredibly comfortable cars to drive for long periods of time and capable of delivering highway economy in the 24 - 25 MPG range. They are also very reliable, with many of them easily providing 200,000 miles with minable problems. 2000 and older models are now eligible for judged LCOC events.

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still plush, but it feels more controlled, and less floaty, now. Lincoln says the Watt's Linkage rear suspension improves straight-line tracking and counters the tendency for the vehicle to squat under acceleration and dive under braking.

Steering improvements are noticeable, but it still feels over-boosted at slow speeds.

Mechanically, the Town Car is almost identical to the Crown Victoria and Grand Marquis. The 4.6-liter, V8 engine puts out 205 horsepower in standard form, but a dual exhaust system on the Cartier and Signature Touring Sedan models bring that to 220. This engine has adequate power and performs smoothly, even though it has to haul around about 4,000 pounds.

Of course, the transmission is automatic, and the lever is mounted on the steering column. Shifting out of overdrive for more power is done by punching a button on the end of the lever.

Last year's redesign of the Town Car was dramatic. This year's addition of side airbags fixes one of the shortcomings and should improve its safety.

Price

The base price of the Cartier model I drove was \$42,825. The premium package (power moonroof and trunk-mounted compact disc player) brought the sticker price to \$45,090.

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bright chartreuse. Besides these decor items, many customers ordered their new cars with even hotter engines. Multiple carburation, aluminum heads, hot ignitions and 3/4 race cams were added as "soup up kits". Later cars were affixed with the new 317 cu. in. Lincoln overhead motor with the dual range Lincomatic (Hydramatic) transmission. These cars were incredibly fast.

Unfortunately Muntz purported to have lost over \$1000 on each car for a grand total loss of \$400,000 during the car's four year stint. In late 1954, Muntz dismantled the entire manufacturing process and destroyed all the tools and dies. His claim of 394 vehicles produced has never been substantiated, but rather, 198 according to extensive serial number research. One count or another, it's a very low production. What is amazing is how well this vehicle is remembered. I guess we need to give the credit to Muntz, Shore and the car that makes you smile.

Warranty

The standard warranty is for four years or 50,000 miles.

Point: While the Town Car has not drunk fully from the Fountain of Youth, it now acts much younger than it used to. The ride is firmer, the styling more contemporary and the engine is smooth.

Counterpoint: Some folks won't like the new styling or the firmer ride.

The steering could use continued improvement for better feel, and the large trunk is hard to load efficiently.

More comments on the 1999 Town Car:

The 1999 Lincoln Town Car is not sexy, but it provides enough room to start a family. Heck, it offers enough room to house one, too. You can seat six adult bodies in a Town Car. You can squeeze two into a Ferrari, assuming that they aren't overweight.

The Town Car comes with modest engine -- a 4.6-liter, single-overhead-cam, electronically fuel-injected V-8 designed to produce 220 horsepower at 4,500 rpm and 290 pound-feet of torque at 3,500 rpm. That's still more power than most of us will ever use. But it's more psychologically accept-

able -- which brings up the matters of stress and excitement.

You get no stress and virtually no excitement with the Town Car. It's a big, comfortable, rear-wheel-drive automobile with a lighter-than-air steering feel and a four-wheel-independent suspension system that seems to make bumps, potholes, ruts and other roadway annoyances disappear.

You can park the Town Car in almost any decent lot or garage. No one will disturb it. People see it as just another executive car -- "a cab for Wall Street lawyers," said a Wall Street lawyer who thinks that "Town Car" is a synonym for "limo."

Complaints: Those memory power seats. Hate 'em! They're always rearranging themselves when you turn off the engine or key the ignition. Like they're operated by a poltergeist. I want simple-to-adjust seats. Okay?

Praise: The Town Car is the Love Boat on wheels.

Ride, acceleration and handling: The Town Car is for people who like to float. If you're into floating, there's no better car.

Head-turning quotient: The Town Car got raves from 55-year-olds.

Safety: Aces for passive safety. Side-impact air bags are now standard.

Mileage: About 24 miles per gallon on regular unleaded for the Town Car. Not bad at all for a full-size family sedan.


