A 1937 Lincoln K LeBaron Coupe A Restoration Journey By Tom Brace

What kind of person buys a luxury coupe? I asked a number of people whose opinions I respect and I liked Beverly Rae Kimes answer the best. "A large multi-cylinder engine under a long hood, a long sloping rear deck, seating for two, all this for me."

I once saw a super charged, 540 K Mercedes cabriolet with a Swedish body. The original owner had ordered the cockpit built so that it would accommodate himself and two women. Certainly that request described his life's view- but I digress.

Lincoln had ordered 24 examples of this wonderful coupe from the firm of LeBaron. I believe that there are about six of these left with different options. I am considering trying to catalog all of the remaining 1937-39 LeBaron coupes that are still with us.

What is new for 1937?

Lincoln offered 21 body types. Headlamps were recessed in the fenders. A split windshield was offered for "greater visibility." The 150 horsepower engine received hydraulic valve lifters to make the engine quieter. These changes mark the end of the Lincoln K era that would be over by 1939.

The story begins.

The serial number of this coupe is K 7604. It was found in a rundown body shop stuffed back against the wall, filthy dirty and all apart. All the sheet metal was off it except the doors. Parts were scattered over the shop in a random fashion. The current owner had a "vision" to make it into a hot rod. To say that idea lacked merit is an understatement.

I made him a one-time cash offer that was good for 24 hours. If he accepted the offer, we would meet at my bank and he would bring the title. Several short term goals were going through my mind. Save it from being turned into a street rod, remove it and as many pieces as I could find from the "body shop". He beat me to the bank the next morning.

Several friends and I began to remove pieces from the shop. I have a 1937 Lincoln K 2-window sedan that we had done a lot of work on and this allowed us to inventory and identify what might be missing. We returned three times to that body shop and then its owner moved twice more. Every time I saw him, I came home with parts.

When you buy a Full Classic apart, make sure that you come away with all of the pieces. If there is a question about whether a part goes with the car, the tie goes to the buyer. I have purchased several Full Classics apart and have ended up with parts that did not belong to the car. You also run the risk of not getting all of the parts and there always seem to be a box "missing." On this purchase, a box of what could be called the jewelry was missing. No taillight lenses or assembly, no headlight lenses, and things like cigar lighters, etc. I found the original LeBaron script in his toolbox along with a set of keys.

Henry J Kaiser 1882 - 1967 Renown Industrialist


American industrialist who became known as the father of modern American shipbuilding. He established the Kaiser Shipyards, which built Liberty ships during World War II, after which he formed Kaiser Aluminum and Kaiser Steel. Kaiser organized Kaiser Permanente health care for his workers and their families. He led Kaiser-Frazer followed by Kaiser Motors, automobile companies known for the safety of their designs. Kaiser was involved in large construction projects

such as civic centers and dams, and invested in real estate. With his acquired wealth, he initiated the Kaiser Family Foundation, a nonprofit, non-partisan, charitable organization.

Kaiser was born on May 9, 1882, in Sprout Brook, New York. He worked as an apprentice photographer early in life, and was running the studio by the age of twenty. He used his savings to move to Washington state, where he started a construction company that fulfilled government contracts.

Kaiser moved to the West Coast in 1906. In 1914 he founded a paving company, one of the first to use heavy construction machinery. His firm expanded significantly in 1927 when it received a \$20-million contract to build roads in Cuba. In 1931 his firm was one of the prime contractors in building the Hoover Dam on the Colorado River, and the Bonneville and Grand Coulee Dams on the Columbia Ríver. He had never built a ship before, but

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he set up shipyards in Seattle and Tacoma, where he began using massproduction techniques, such as using welding instead of rivets.

Henry Kaiser became most famous for the Kaiser Shipyard in Richmond, California, during World War II, adopting production techniques that built cargo ships with an average constructíon time of 45 days. These ships became known as Liberty ships and were later supplemented in the míd-war by ímproved, larger and faster Victory ships. He became world renowned when his teams built a ship in four days.

The keel for the 10,500 ton SS Robert E. Peary was laid on Sunday, November 8, 1942, and the ship was launched in California from the Richmond Shipyard #2 on Thursday, November 12, four days and 15½ hours later. The previous record had been 10 days for the Liberty ship Joseph

A visit to a Ford assembly plant by one of his associates led to the decision to use welding instead of riveting for shipbuilding. Welding was advantageous in that it took less strength and it was easier to teach thousands of employees, mostly unskilled laborers and many of them women. Kaiser adopted the use of subassemblies in ship construction; formerly, hundreds of laborers crowded together to complete a ship. Though this practice had been tried on the East Coast and in Britain. Kaiser was able to take full advantage of the process by constructing new shipyards with this in mind.

You can buy much more of a car if it is apart. There are other problems that you will encounter such as missing parts, and you were not the person who took it apart. I once read that for every hour you spend taking it apart, it takes ten hours to put it back together. I would also state that there are certain protocols in taking something apart and a cutting torch is not one of them.

We placed the engine in the bare frame and started it. We knew who had rebuilt the engine but it had never been started. The engine had sat for over 25 years in less-than-ideal storage. Using 20 weight oil and a quart of Rislone, we pressured the oil to 40 pounds and tried to start it. The timing was off but we finally got it started. The block leaked, the lifters were noisy but it ran. We did do the radiator first as we did not want to circulate rusty water into the fresh blocks. We jacked up the rear tires and ran through the gears. The transmission and rear end sounded pretty good.

We thought that we might look at the top of the engine and removed the heads. We also dropped the pan to take some measurements. Well, you know the rest of the story. We went back through this "new engine" and replaced valves, pistons, rings, etc. All of the accessories were also refreshed and we did not find any part that did not need something. Our goal was to eventually tour this car and repairing a Full Classic along-side a road is not my idea of fun. I have a high speed rear end that I have not yet placed in the car.

Wood or where did it go?

The body of this Lincoln is constructed of ash with an aluminum skin over it. The top is leather covered. It has a rear window that opens outward at the bottom allowing a nice flow of air through the cockpit. About half of the frame around the window was missing as well as the huge package shelf and a number of floorboards.

I had watched a man restoring a 1939 Chris Craft Barrel Back in my next door neighbor's garage. I had loaned him a large chain hoist that I bought at an estate sale. He needed to lift the boat off of the trailer. I asked him if he had done any automotive wood working and he said no. I convinced him to work with us on the coupe. He worked in oak and mahogany but ash was a new experience for him. He did a wonderful job and was somewhat disappointed to find out that none of his work would show. At the end of the project, he did all of the window moldings in a satin finish. I believe that the wood is walnut with a burl walnut facing. One source stated that the wood was 'made of fine curly maple."

His knowledge of wood working and boats resulted in a rear window that fit, doors that fit and all of the garnish moldings reflecting the Lincoln

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couver yard on November 16, 1942. The Kaiser hulls also became Ameríca's smaller, more numerous "escort carríers". over one hundred small aircraft carriers employed in both the Pacific and the Atlantic theaters. The concepts he developed for the mass production of commercial and military ships remain in use today.

At Kaiser Shipyards in Richmond, California, Kaiser implemented the pioneering idea of Dr. Sidney Garfield of Kaiser Permanente. Opened on August 10, 1942, Kaíser Ríchmond Field Hospital for Kaiser Shipyards was financed by the U.S. Maritime Commission, sponsored by Henry J. Kaiser's Permanente Foundation, and run by Dr. Garfield. In part due to wartime materials rationing, the Field Hospítal was a síngle-story wood frame structure designed in a simple modernist mode. Originally intended for use primarily as an emergency facility, the Field Hospital opened with only 10 beds.

quality. I am in his debt. One of the great things about a restoration project is that opportunity to meet some wonderful craftsmen and to work along-side them and observe their skills.

Color

The correct color on a Full Classic can make or break a car. In my opinion, the world does not need another black Full Classic. The original color that the car came in is always a good place to start. Canal gray was a LeBaron color and can be best described as a medium gray with a little blue and a very fine metallic. The pin stripe was Vermillion, a deep orange with some red overtones in it. We were very pleased with the original LeBaron colors. We found the original color on the back side of the glove box door that had never been exposed to light or wear. We sent the glove box door to "Jimmy Chips" in California who matched it perfectly. Sidemounts or Fenderwells.

Edsel Ford by this time was trying to woo the purchaser away from the use of sidemounts. He believed that they detracted from the overall lines of the car. My 1937 K 2-window sedan does have sidemounts and it is an imposing front end. The Coupe on the other hand does not have sidemounts and the lines of the car are very sleek. I appreciate having examples of both.

Interior

This coupe has two trunks that are all lined. The interior is cloth although there are at least two LeBaron coupes that have leather. The roster project mentioned earlier will add a lot to our general knowledge. The roof is a padded leather with a defi-

nite long grain that is very attractive and the underside is part of a complete headliner.

Tires

It is amazing how many choices there are for a 7.50x17 tires. The coupe has Firestones and the Sedan has B.F. Goodrich. The shield for the Firestone tires came painted red during this period and that detail was added by the pin striper. I believe that this coupe would look well in either a black wall tire or a white wall tire. It took a long time to decide which direction to go.

K 7604

This coupe was shipped to Oklahoma City (Branch #25) by the Pennsylvania Railroad on 12-16-36. Special equipment included a radio and individual seat adjustments. This coupe was the 5th built by LeBaron and came with a tool kit. These complete kits are extremely rare and Byron Olsen of St. Paul, Minnesota may have the best original known.

The coupe was in the Minneapolis area for a number of years. People with long histories with the UMR/ CCCA remember the car. It later ended up in South Dakota. One local member drove to South Dakota only to have the agreed-upon price raised when he arrived. He passed on the car. It was then partially disassembled and finally sold at an auction. The car returned to Jordan, Minnesota, which is south of the twin cities, to an individual who owned a motorcycle salvage business. Years ago, I saw the engine out of the car, on the floor of a repair shop at the motorcycle salvage business. The car was then sold to the man that I purchased the car from. It was moved literally

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Later additions increased its capacity to 160 beds by 1944. The Field Hospital in Richmond operated as a Kaiser Permanente hospital until closing in 1995.

Kaiser's Richmond Field Hospital served as the mid-level component of a three-tier medical care system that included six welleguipped First Aid Stations at the shipyards, and the main Permanente Hospital in Oakland, where the most critical cases were treated. By August 1944, 92.2 percent of all Richmond shipyard employees had joined Kaiser Permanente, the first voluntary group plan in the country to feature group medical practice, prepayment, and substantial medical facilities on such a large scale. After the war ended, the Health Plan was expanded to include workers' famílies. To serve employees at his diverse businesses, Kaiser opened Permanente facilities in Walnut Creek, California, in Hawaii, in Southern California, and eventually in many other lo-

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from next door to the previously described body shop. I found two heads from the coupe that were still at the motorcycle shop and was able to purchase them. They did not have any other parts. I am still trying to trace more of the history. Someone painted it black and as the dash was painted body color without a lot of attention to masking off some of the decorative strips. We totally disassembled the dash and started all over again.

Public viewing

The first outing for K 7604 was St. Louis, MO at their Grand Classic. It was appropriate that after serving on the National Board for nine years, that a CCCA event would be the proper first- time venue. The reaction was very favorable. We were treated very well and the coupe won 100 points in Primary. We went on throughout the summer where it received 99.25(Senior) in Dearborn and some type of award every place that it was exhibited.

The reaction to this car has been very positive. Knowledgeable people have given the coupe high praise and have been very generous with their comments. The fact that many have been friends and fellow Board members was particularly appreciated.

We will take the car to The Experience for an opportunity to earn its Premier Badge. After all CCCA award catagories are completed, we look forward to driving it down the blue line roads. I believe that a Full Classic should be driven as it was when new. The absolute best place to accomplish this would be a CARavan.

The Kaiser Center in downtown Oakland served as the head-quarters of Kaiser Industries. Up to that time, it was Oakland's tallest building, as well as "the largest office tower west of Chicago".

As a real-estate magnate, Kaíser founded the Honolulu suburban community of Hawaii Kai in Hawaii (where there is a public high school named in his honor) and a high school named in his honor in Fontana, California. Kaiser also financed the development of Panorama Cíty, a planned community in the San Fernando Valley portion of Los Angeles.



In 1945, Kaiser partnered with vet-eran automobile executive Joseph Frazer to establish a new automobile company from the remnants of Graham-Paige, of which Frazer had been president. It would use a surplus Ford Motor

In 1953, Kaíser purchased Willys-Overland, manufacturer of the Jeep line of utility vehicles, changing its name to Willys Motors. In 1963, the name was changed again to Kaiser-Jeep, which was ultimately sold to American Motors Corporation in 1970.

Kaiser spent much of his later years in Honolulu and developed an obsession with perfecting its urban landscape. He founded the Kaiser Hawaiian Village Hotel, today known as the Hilton Hawaiian Village. Kaiser constructed one of the first commercially practical geodesic domes in the United States at this resort. In the míd-1950s Kaiser recognized that television could make Kaiser brand products known to the public. He worked with Warner Brothers head Iack Warner to develop WB's fírst televísíon series, Cheyenne, sponsored by household products including Kaiser aluminum foil and Kaiser cars. To promote his Hawaii ventures. Kaiser induced Warner Brothers to copy the formula of its popular series 77 Sunset Stríp as new TV series Hawaiian Eye. Though actually filmed at WB studios in Burbank, California, the show featured private detectives based at Kaiser's Hawaiian Vil-

Lincoln goes to China

The Lincoln Motor Company today unveiled the MKX Concept at Auto China 2014 in Beijing. The Lincoln MKX Concept hints at a global SUV that will become the third of four all-new Lincoln vehicles due by 2016. It is designed to capture the attention of consumers worldwide.

This unveiling in Beijing marks the first time Lincoln has stepped beyond U.S. borders to reveal a concept vehicle.

Drawing design inspiration from airplanes and motorbikes, the Lincoln MKX Concept evokes feelings of power and agility, offering a glimpse of the American luxury brand's future as it enters the rapidly growing Chinese market.

Several customer research clinics were held in China and the United States to gather feedback on the design to ensure the final execution would satisfy and delight luxury customers around the world.

"Great emphasis was put on the proportions of this concept vehicle," said Andrea Di Buduo, exterior design manager of the Lincoln MKX Concept. "It's a very emotional, athletic design. Its horizontal lines and defined undercuts are gracefully integrated and very sophisticated, yet convey a powerful and dynamic

presence."

Intensive study of the Chinese luxury customer over the past few years revealed that a medium premium utility vehicle should express off-road capability and sportiness.

Based on that, the MKX Concept includes elements such as a separated front skid plate, heightened ground clearance and reinforced wheel arches. The floating aluminum bodyside rocker molding is engraved with the Lincoln logo.

This execution communicates adaptability to different road conditions, combined with crafted execution and attention to detail.

Defined by an aerodynamic, sloping teardrop roofline, the Lincoln MKX Concept's modern silhouette lends to its sporty personality, which is highlighted by wide shoulders flanking its recessed rear windows to heighten the design. Dynamic side undercuts, a high beltline and 21-inch machined aluminum wheels further enhance the well-proportioned design.

The roof over the rear was lowered to give the vehicle a sleeker shape. Highlighted by a panoramic glass surface that lets natural light fill the cabin and integrated roof racks, the floating rear spoiler houses the center high-mounted stop light and hides the antenna.

The Lincoln MKX Concept offers a new interpretation of Lincoln's signature full-width taillamps.

"Concept vehicles are defined by every design detail," said David Woodhouse, Lincoln design director, "and this MKX Concept shows how Lincoln's thoughtful design philosophy continues to evolve. The Lincoln brand was built on vehicles with

His legacy. Kaiser was involved in building civic centers, roads, and schools. He was part of the consortium that constructed the Hoover Dam and Grand Coulee Dam. Kaiser is also noted for advancing medicine with the development and construction of several hospítals, medícal centers and medical schools. His mining town of Eagle Mountaín, Californía, part of the West Coast's first integrated mining/ processing operation linked by rail to his mill in Fontana, California, was the birthplace of Kaiser Permanente, the first health maintenance organizatíon. Fontana is home to another public high school named in his honor.

"That momentum continues with this MKX Concept. It demonstrates the design direction for the third allnew vehicle from Lincoln, one that will capture the true essence of the brand – warm and inviting, beautifully styled, and with the promise of engaging technologies that appeal to a younger luxury consumer in a global market."

Lincoln will enter the Chinese market later this year when MKZ and

MKC go on sale. An MKX production model would compete in the fast -growing midsize premium utility segment there. With 245,000 sales in 2013, the segment has grown 9,650 percent in the past five years. Premium midsize utility vehicles – which represent 17 percent of the luxury market and 45 percent of the luxury utility market in China – are projected to grow an additional 84 percent, to more than 450,000 units by 2018.

In the United States, the segment grew 13 percent from 2008 to 2013, to 441,000 units. That growth is expected to continue through 2018, when projections call for almost 550,000 vehicle sales. Globally, the midsize premium utility segment accounted for 839,000 sales in 2013, and is projected to eclipse 1.2 million sales by 2018.


